#### **Faith Lutheran Church**

On Easter Sunday, Faith Lutheran Church in Cambridge, MA suffered a devastating fire that burned down most of the building. New England Synod eNews April 17, 2023

Dear New England Synod,

On Sunday, I worshipped with the congregation of Faith Lutheran Church in Cambridge, MA. You will recall that this congregation suffered a devasting fire to its building, on 311 Broadway, late last Sunday evening. Thankfully no one was in the building then and no one was injured. The cause of the fire has yet to be determined. However, the 100-year-old building suffered significant damage, that required six engine companies to respond to control and end the fire. Last Tuesday, the church's steeple was removed to prevent further damage. However, the cross which stood atop that steeple now stands inside the sanctuary where the congregation will worship for the foreseeable future.



Pastor Robin Lutjohann and the congregation have received many blessings, with an outpouring of prayers, donations and the offering of the nearby Pentecostal Tabernacle for worship. On Sunday, the congregation's pastor welcomed Faith Lutheran to worship in their space on Sunday mornings (the Pentecostal congregation worships at 4 pm on Sundays) and provided a love offering of \$5,000. Earlier in the week, Faith Lutheran's shared feeding ministry operated out of the nearby synagogue, with which they have partnered in that ministry for 20 years. Then on Wednesday, the local mosque welcomed the congregation for its weekly prayer service, where they broke bread together in fellowship. All of this is a testimony to how God's Holy Spirit works to bring about hope and healing in this loss.

What can you do? While the congregation has significant support and is fully insured, there are high additional costs to their recovery. If you would like to support them in their efforts, I invite you to join me in contributing via the church's Go Fund Me page. The link is here.

Fortunately, the congregation has wise and experienced architects, attorneys and finance people. They are indeed one of our small but mighty congregations. They have also received support and advice from nearby congregations which have experienced similar events. That shared wisdom exemplifies the fruits of a collaboration that Faith has engaged in for many years.

During worship, I offered the prayers of this whole synod for the people of Faith Lutheran, who are clearly people of faith. Again and again, I was impressed with their resilience. The worship opened with Hymn 652, Built on a Rock, which contains the opening stanza: "Built on a rock the church shall stand, even when steeples are falling."

I invite you to continue praying for this congregation as they walk through a long, challenging road ahead.

#### Former Pastor's Article: June 1999

In the spring, Holy Trinity's church office uncovered documents of old Tidings newsletters in our basement. While Pastor Luther is away, and unable to write articles for us, Holy Trinity would like to share several enlightening articles from the Tidings, written by Pastor Dave Snyder (Pastor from 1989 to 1997) and Pastor Paul Lindstrom (interim Pastor from 1997 to 2000). We plan on having a Former Pastor's Article in the Tidings every other week.

Among the greatest lines from Tennessee Williams is this one: 'The future is called perhaps.'

What lies ahead for Holy Trinity? What is God calling us as a congregation to be about? The answers are at the heart of what the Vision Committee is about. But its not the Vision Committee that provides the answers to those questions. Ifs the congregation, you the people of Holy Trinity that together need to discern what we believe God would have us be about as we seek to carry on Christ's work in this community.



Some of us think about Holy Trinity's future the way we think about marketing---living in the conviction that if we advertise, have a good product (i.e. the right pastor) and invest our energy in recruitment, we can continue to grow and Holy Trinity's place in the future will be assured.

Still others of us think about Holy Trinity's future the way my old neighbor thought about investments---don't taken any risks, because you might end up losing. (Sadly, he didn't end up winning either, and when he died, his once considerable nest egg was pretty depleted.)

We can learn another way to think about Holy Trinity's future from Abraham, who heard those fateful words from God: "Go forth from your native land and from your father's house to the land that I will show you." Abraham went, he overcame his fears, and he was willing to make a new beginning even at his advanced age." "Give us faith to go out with good courage", we pray, "not knowing where we go, but only that your hand is leading us, and your love supporting us." Every time I pray that prayer, I think of Abraham. It's one of my favorite prayers and can be found at the close of the service of Evening Prayer in our Lutheran Book of Worship. Holy Trinity's future is clear in the mind of God, but none of us knows it yet. And like

Abraham, we can only move out in faith that God is leading us. The process the Vision Committee is leading us into is based on the premise that all of us are in a relationship with a God who is ever more ready to communicate with us than we are to listen.

It is a process that seeks to discern God's will for our parish. At the very heart of the Christian faith lies one fundamental question: How can we understand and live the will of God? This desire, this longing to seek to do God's will, is what will be our focus as a parish this summer as we prepare to call a pastor. We can never be sure that we have truly and fully comprehended God will, but we can make it our prayer and then trust that the Holy Spirit will lead.
